### Scope and Mission

The *American Sociological Review* publishes *original* (not previously published) works of interest to the discipline in general, new theoretical developments, results of qualitative or quantitative research that advance our understanding of fundamental social processes, and important methodological innovations. All areas of sociology are welcome. Emphasis is on exceptional quality and general interest.

### Manuscript Submission

**Ethics:** Submission of a manuscript to another professional journal while it is under review by the *ASR* is regarded by the ASA as unethical. Significant findings or contributions that have already appeared (or will appear) elsewhere must be clearly identified. All persons who publish in ASA journals are required to abide by ASA guidelines and ethics codes regarding plagiarism and other ethical issues. This includes adhering to ASA's stated policy on data-sharing: "Sociologists make their data available after completion of the project or its major publications, except where proprietary agreements with employers, contractors, or clients preclude such accessibility or when it is impossible to share data and protect the confidentiality of the data or the anonymity of research participants (e.g., raw field notes or detailed information from ethnographic interviews)" (*ASA Code of Ethics*, 1997).

**Manuscript format:** Manuscripts should meet the format guidelines specified in the *Notice to Contributors* published in the February and August issues of each volume. All text must be printed *double-spaced* on 8-1/2 by 11 inch white paper. Use an easy-to-read typeface; monospace type (e.g., courier) in 12-point size is preferred. Margins on all four sides must be at least 1-1/4 inches. Include the word count on your title page. You may cite your own work, but do not use wording that identifies you as the author.

**What to submit:** Submit *six (6) copies* of your manuscript and an *abstract* of 150 to 200 words. Include a copy on *computer diskette* as well. Both IBM and Macintosh file formats are acceptable. (Please include a note if you are unable to provide your manuscript on diskette.) Enclose a *\$15.00 manuscript processing fee* in the form of a check or money order payable to the American Sociological Association. *ASR* will acknowledge the receipt of your manuscript if you provide your *e-mail address* or enclose a *stamped self-addressed postcard*. Manuscripts are not returned after review. In your cover letter, *you may recommend specific reviewers* (or identify individuals *ASR* should not use). Do not recommend colleagues, collaborators, or friends. *ASR* may choose to disregard your recommendation.

**Editorial decisions:** Decisions are generally made within 14 weeks of the date your manuscript is received at the *ASR* office. *If your manuscript is accepted* you will be asked to submit your final version both on paper (2 copies) and on computer diskette. Special arrangements will be made if you are unable to provide a diskette.
