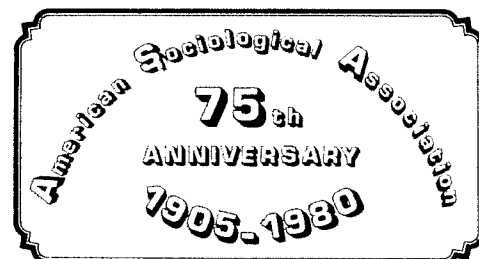

CHAOS, COMPETITION AND CREATIVITY

The current diversity of paradigms, scholarly styles, and substantive concerns of the field of sociology is recognized in the theme, "Chaos, Competition and Creativity" set for the 1980 ASA Convention.

Our field has emerged from the 1970's with a rather wide variety of research and scholarly styles ranging from highly sophisticated quantitative styles on the one hand and equally sophisticated highly qualitative styles on the other. Substantive concerns range widely as well from concern with tuning up the present society as exemplified in the work of applied sociologists to forecasting the forms of a radically different future society. The profession is diversified in its occupational activities as well as with denizens of ivory towers and policy makers both holding cards in the ASA.

This diversity, I believe, is a cause for celebration. We are going through a period of great creativity. What appears to be chaos is, in fact, competition among varying views that will lead in the end to the emergence of a field that will have a sense of where it is going, a conviction that it is an important intellectual endeavor, and convinced that it has something to say to a society that needs its special point of view.

The celebration of diversity that is implied in the chosen theme is hardly one that leads to a single focus for the 1980 Convention. Consequently, ASA members who attend can expect to find creativity displayed in the full variety of current styles, in a very diverse set of topics, and in planned juxtaposition of opposing, competing points of view.

ASA Executive Office—Madison

The Headquarters Office will be staffed from Tuesday through Sunday by Executive Office personnel. They are in attendance for the purpose of keeping the convention operating and solving problems as they arise. However, the demands on staff time and equipment must be limited to official ASA functions. Individuals or groups requiring office equipment should arrange for the rental of this equipment directly with suppliers. A commercial reproduction center is available on the 2nd floor of the hotel.

ASA Information Desk—Promenade

This desk will be staffed with ASA Executive Office personnel who will provide information on membership, subscriptions, etc. Copies of the 1980 *Directory of Members*, *Directory of Departments*, and *Guide to Graduate Departments of Sociology* will be available for purchase, as will other ASA publications. Sample copies of ASA journals will also be available for inspection.

Book Exhibits—Rhineland Gallery

Book Exhibits for the New York meeting will open on Wednesday, August 27 and will close at 3:00 p.m. on Saturday, August 30. Exhibit hours: Wednesday—Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; Saturday, 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The Rhineland Gallery is adjacent to the ASA Registration Area. Seventy-three exhibitors have reserved booth space (see "Directory of Exhibitors" listed elsewhere in this Program).

Child Care—Room 507-510

Child care is being provided by personnel from the Bank Street College of Education, a well-known center for training in early childhood education. Care will be available during daytime program sessions (8:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.) for children three months and up.

A normal day care experience will be provided, in which children will have the opportunity to explore a variety of materials and situations. The day will include free play, arts and crafts, music, books, blocks and toys, etc. In addition, snacks will be provided and a time for naps or rest.

Parents should either arrange to take their children out for lunch or send a bag lunch.

Payment will be by the day or the half-day, rather than by the hour: \$5 for a half-day (8:30 a.m.-1:30 p.m.; 1:30 p.m.-6:30 p.m.) and \$10 for an entire day. Children may come for shorter periods, but the half-day fee will still apply, in order to encourage more stable use, discourage frequent dropping in and out (which is difficult for both children and staff), and to simplify payment.

Employment Service—Sutton Ballroom

The Employment Service, again under the capable management of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Clement, will be open Tuesday, 12:30 p.m.-5:00 p.m.; Wednesday through Saturday, 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; and Sunday, 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Facilities will be available for reviewing listings, exchanging messages, and interviewing. If you have pre-registered for the Employment Service, report to the Sutton (South) Ballroom as soon as possible to activate your file. If you have not registered, you should do so as early as possible.

All persons using the Service must register for the Annual Meeting as well as for the use of the Employment Service. Once registered, you will be issued a pass permitting your entrance to the Service any time it is open. No one will be admitted without a pass. Fees for the use of the Employment Service are: ASA member applicants—\$5; non-ASA member applicants—\$20; Employers—\$25.

Paper Sales—Clinton

Papers will go on sale at 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday at the price of \$1.00 each. All session papers which were submitted to the Executive Office for duplication and/or distribution at the Annual Meeting appear on the list of "Available Papers" (copies available in the Paper Sales Room) and may be purchased as long as supply lasts. Orders cannot be accepted for future delivery. Requests for papers which have sold out or were not supplied must be sent directly to the author(s); in order to facilitate this procedure, a list of authors' addresses may be purchased for \$1.00. The Executive Office is not able to return unsold copies of papers to individual authors; however, authors may pickup remaining copies of their own papers (including those that ASA duplicated) on Sunday between 1:30 p.m. and 3:30 p.m.

Thursday evening's Plenary Session will feature Peter H. Rossi's Presidential Address, which will follow the presentation of the ASA Career of Distinguished Scholarship Award, the ASA Distinguished Contribution to Scholarship Award, and the ASA Distinguished Contributions to Teaching Award.

The third Plenary Session, to be held on Friday evening, is entitled "Critical Institutions: Occupations, Labor Markets and Firms". Peter H. Rossi will preside, with papers to be presented by Seymour Spilerman, Columbia University, and Rosabeth Moss Kanter, Yale University.
