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2023 was an exciting year for the American Sociological Association. We undertook many activities, including:

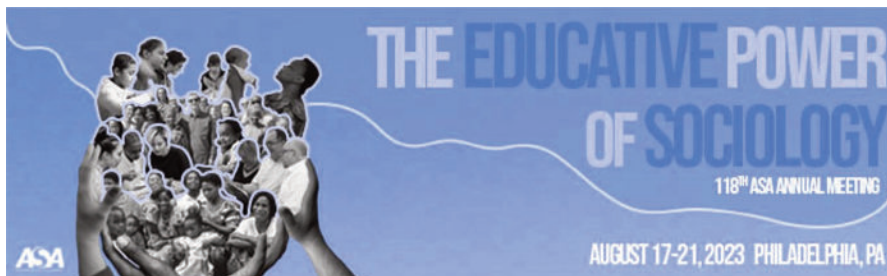
- Hosting our Annual Meeting in Philadelphia, which drew about 4,800 attendees and focused on the educative power of sociology.

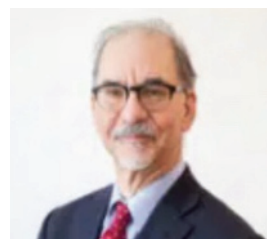

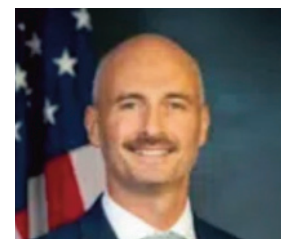

Professional Development and Networking for All

Community College Faculty held several networking opportunities, including the community college coffee hour.

The Teaching Resources and Innovation Library for Sociology (TRAILS) board members held the “GIFTS: Good Ideas for Teaching Sociology and Publishing in TRAILS” workshop.

Sociology Action Network Advisory Board offered the “Community-Engaged Pedagogies for Teaching and Mentoring Undergraduate and Graduate Students” workshop.

ASA Retirement Network planned many activities, including a business meeting; the annual Life in Sociology Lecture with keynote speaker Kenneth Land, Duke University; a panel, “Chronic Illness, Grief, and Retirement: Personal Experiences Navigating Changes in Health, Stigma, Well-Being, and Access to Health Care;” and another panel, “Community Engagement and Social Justice Activism by Retired Sociologists” that was cohosted with Sociologists for Women in Society.

The Student Forum Advisory Board served as an organizer for three paper sessions, multiple roundtable sessions, a workshop, a reception, and a business meeting. It offered travel funding to 45 students who were on the Annual Meeting program. It awarded Kathleen D’Alfonso, State University of New York at Buffalo, the 2023 Student Paper Award for their paper titled, “Does Health Insurance Matter? A Cross-Sectional Analysis of Health Outcomes Among U.S. Hispanic Adults.”

The 2023 Honors Program Cohort, consisting of 26 students from 20 institutions, attended an orientation, panels, briefings, roundtables, and receptions. Honors students also presented their research during the Honors Discussion Table Session.

Filipino Sociologists met in person multiple times throughout the year, including at the Annual Meeting, Sociologists for Women in Society summer and winter meetings, and in Manila, Philippines, during a member research trip.

Supporting Professional Development

ASA provided professional development support to members for teaching, research, and career development. An overview of some of our activity follows.

TRAILS

Through the Teaching Resources and Innovation Library for Sociology (TRAILS), our members have access to nearly 3,500 published resources, including assignments, syllabi, lectures, and other teaching ideas.

In 2023, TRAILS Editor Stephanie Medley-Rath, University of Indiana-Kokomo, led 40 editorial board members in the peer-review process of submissions and publications, and added seven new curated collections:

We created an open-access collection in TRAILS for high school sociologists, which includes resources submitted by high school instructors, as well as 100-level college material that can be easily adapted for high school students. In addition, the “High School Workshop Toolkit,” which is also available on TRAILS, offers a collection of lessons and activities that coincide with the four learning domains found in the National Standards for High School Sociology

Virtual Programming

We provided virtual programming tailored for students, teachers, and department leaders through webinars, proseminars, and forums on timely topics aimed at strengthening their professional lives. In 2023, we also launched the virtual “ChairLink Live: Forums on the Fifth,” for department chairs to discuss challenges and solutions with their peers on the fifth of every month.

Shifting the Academic Ecology to Support Community-Engaged Scholarship

In 2023, we embarked on a pilot project titled “Shifting the Academic Ecology to Support Community Engaged Scholarship” that is funded by the William T. Grant Foundation and supported by the Sociology Action Network Advisory Board. The project is designed to test a process for engaging sociology departments and relevant institutional administrators in review of their promotion and tenure criteria with the aim of remedying the disconnect between traditional academic reward structures and socially transformative research.

Drawing on the ASA’s strength as a disciplinary convener, we brought together the sociology departments at Howard University, George Washington University, and the University of Maryland-College Park to participate in the pilot project, along with relevant members of administration at each institution. The three teams met on their own campuses to complete structured tasks specific to the project goals and also collectively to inform and enhance each other’s efforts. The project will conclude in 2024.

A workshop introducing ASA members to the project was held at the Annual Meeting. In addition, the project’s principal investigator, Heather Washington, ASA Deputy Director, presented the project at a Pew Charitable Trusts meeting on incentives and infrastructure for societally impactful research. She also discussed the project at the annual ACLS Consortium meeting where deans of humanities and deans of arts and sciences from multiple U.S. institutions came together to discuss various issues the humanities and social sciences are facing in academia.

ASA Student Forum

Members of the Student Forum hosted two workshops titled “Tips and Tricks for Submitting and Preparing for ASA Annual Meeting” and “Career Pathways for PhDs,” and a writing session.

Sociologists in the News

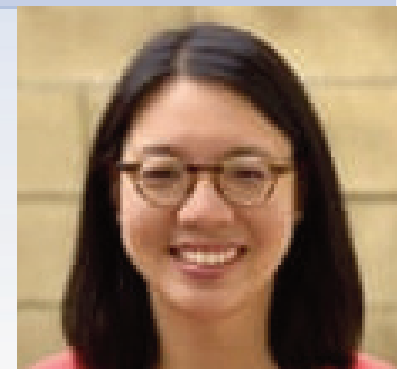

Demonstrating the Value of Sociology

We submitted a public comment objecting to the Florida Board of Governors' proposal to remove sociology from the state's general education core course options.

We released a statement on the importance of teaching and learning about race and racism.

Defending Academic Freedom

ASA released a statement reiterating the importance of fostering an environment where the free exchange of ideas, diverse perspectives, and open discourse can thrive.

We encouraged leaders at University of Notre Dame, New College of Florida, and Hamline University to uphold the tenets of academic freedom when they were facing challenges.

“If leaders of our academic institutions fail to exert true leadership when their faculty are under attack, the fundamental value of academic freedom will become aspirational rather than enacted and serious scholars will seek other places to work where they can engage with ideas with integrity.”
